Robert C. Hoopman

Robert is a watercolor artist working in the Plymouth area since 2002. He studied art and architecture at Iowa State University and spent his professional career working as an architect in Boston, Massachusetts. He studied watercolor with James Michael, Wynn Jones, and Ratindra Das, and has been painting with Ratindra since 2006. Robert has taught watercolor with Jean Crane and Ratindra Das. He switched to watercolor from oils because he was fascinated by the qualities of watercolor paint: transparency and fusion of color. As an architect, he was always interested in the design of his paintings. He doesn't necessarily paint what he sees, but what he feels. He tries to convey the feeling of a subject, not just the physical appearance. He enjoys strong color and endeavors to use a color palette which reinforces the interest and the feeling he is trying to convey, not necessarily the local color of the scene he is painting. Many of his paintings are taken from subjects derived from his travels. He has exhibited in various shows and won many awards. He is a member of the Wisconsin Watercolor Society and has exhibited work many of their shows, in various shows at the Plymouth Arts Center, and with the Transparent Watercolor Society of America in Kenosha, WI. website

Waterlilies and Glass Globes

Workshop dates:

March 18-20, 2024 (9:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.)



During this workshop, students will focus on waterlilies and glass and their reflections in water: Water can act like glass and give an almost perfect reflection of the object or distort the objects due to movements of the surface. Students will create a realistic painting of waterlilies and a glass globe floating in water. They will learn how to paint the dark, textured water that will emphasize the waterlilies and glass globe as they reflect the sun, using methods including lifting, layering, and wet-on-wet painting. Students will paint the artist's image of waterlilies and glass globes. Image and drawing will be provided.

Lorraine Watry is a very generous artist and instructor. She is known for and likes the challenge of painting reflections in water and glass, but she also became intrigued with reflections in band instruments while helping with her son's high school band and went on to paint many stunning images.

Because her paintings are so different, she says she does not have a set process of working. Besides the subject matter, color, texture, and pattern are some of the most important aspects of her watercolors. She composes in her camera and uses these images to paint detailed paintings. As a Colorado native, she is influenced by the beautiful blue skies and strong lights and shadows.







San Mateo County History Museum 2200 Broadway, Redwood City

We will paint views of the <u>San Mateo County History Museum</u> from Courthouse Square. The museum is housed in the 1910 County Courthouse which is on the National Register of Historic Places. The inside of the rotunda is as beautiful on the inside as the dome is on the outside, so you may wish to pay museum admission, \$6 for adults and \$4 for seniors, to view the courthouse from the inside.

Parking: There is parking at the Jefferson Parking Garage, 830 Jefferson Ave, <u>map</u>, which is free for first 1½ hours and \$0.25 each hour thereafter. Take your ticket with you and pay at the machine before you go back to your car. Click <u>here</u> for additional parking options including metered parking on the street.

Directions: Drive north on US-101 to Redwood City, take exit 408 for CA-84 W/ Woodside Rd, continue for about 0.4 miles. As soon as you have gone through the underpass under US 101, turn right onto Veterans Blvd and go 0.7 miles. Turn left onto Main St and go 0.2 miles, then turn right onto Broadway and go about 0.1 miles to the intersection of Jefferson Ave. Either continue another block and the History Museum is on the right, or turn left onto Jefferson Ave, go ½ block and the parking garage is on the right (look for "Public Parking" sign).

If you can handle your art gear on the train, the Redwood City CalTrain station is only about 2 blocks from the History Museum. From the train walk north on Winslow Street away from the railroad tracks for one block, turn right on Broadway and walk 1 ½ blocks and the museum is on your left.

General Information:

The usual start time for Paintsites is flexible. Unless a different start time is announced, the organizers will be there from around 10 am. Since a couple of the sites are remote where mobile service may be absent, the coordinators may be unreachable, or GPS inaccurate, please check instructions before heading out. Often people stay until early afternoon, taking a packed lunch to eat at the site.

Please note: Should inclement weather or unforeseen events cause cancellation of an event, it will be announced on the "Thursday Paintsites" section of scvws.org by 8 AM on the day of the event. Cancellation will also be announced by email, but the timing of SCVWS Paintsite emails cannot be guaranteed.

Hike & Sketch or Sit & Paint Rancho San Vicente, Calero County Park Morgan Hill map

This POST protected trail has views of rolling hills and Mt Umunhum. Hikers will leave from the parking lot and take a moderate 1.5 mile hike to lookouts along North Ridge Trail. It may be too early for most wildflowers but if our timing is right, the rolling hills will be blooming in yellow mustard.

Directions: From the north, take 280S to 85S. Exit at Almaden Expressway and turn right. Take Almaden Expressway down and go right on Harry Road. From Harry Road, go left onto McKean Road. Follow McKean Road and the parking lot for Rancho San Vicente will be on the right across from Fortini Road.

McClellan Ranch

This park was once a working ranch. There is a meadow rimmed with sycamore trees which border Stevens Creek, plus a tank house, barns, and a replica of an old blacksmith shop. The ranch house has a covered porch, and there is a large covered patio in front of the new Environmental Education Center which provides views of some of the open space and buildings.

Directions: Take Highway 280 to Cupertino. Exit south on Saratoga-Sunnyvale Road (De Anza Blvd.) turn right on McClellan. The park is two miles from De Anza Blvd. and is on your right, across from the golf course.



sight sizing

Sight sizing is a method of drawing an object exactly as it appears to the artist. It is done on a one-to-one scale. It was developed in the 19th century, and it builds your ability to see, replicate, and render objects from direct observation.

COLOR TEMPERATURE & ORGANIZING YOUR PALETTE



Organizing your palette with color temperature in mind

In my workshops, I stress the importance of having an organized palette. But even more so, I stress that the paint is laid out in a logical progression of temperature. It's much easier to adjust the temperature of color mixtures this way. Is the mixture too warm? If adding more of the cool component doesn't work, move one color over in the cool direction, and add a bit of that. Is the mixture too cool? If adding more of the warm component doesn't work, move one color over in the warm direction, and add a little of that.


Without your colors in the proper sequence, you'll find yourself hunting for the right adjustment color, wasting time, and probably making errors.




The colors can be laid out in either a line or a circle. I lay out mine in a line, starting with yellow on the left. Why? Because I put my white on that side, next to the yellow, and this way there's less chance for the white to get tainted by a dark color. So, the line starts off with coolish colors (yellows), moves to warm (reds), and ends with cools again (blues). My palette includes two versions of each primary, a warm and a cool, which is also called a split-primary palette.

Color Thermostat

As I paint, I treat this line more like a circle, mentally joining the cool yellow end to the cool blue end. When I want to adjust the temperature of a color or mixture, I just go around the circle as needed, clockwise or counterclockwise.




This circle is, of course, the color wheel. But imagine it as a sort of color thermostat, where you can dial the temperature you need by shifting around the wheel. Below are some examples of this technique in action.



Cooling Colors Down

Let's start with a single color, Napthol Scarlet. If I want to make it cooler, I add a little of the color next over in the cool direction or Alizarin Permanent. If I want

to make it even cooler, I can move over one more step and add Ultramarine Blue.



Warming Colors Up

Now let's look at a mixture of two colors. Here I've made a cool green with Cerulean Blue Hue and Hansa

Yellow Light. If I want to warm it up, I can add more of the warm component, Hansa Yellow Light. But if I want to push it even more, I can go one more step in the warm direction and add a little Hansa Yellow Deep.
