Did you know?

One of the best things you can do to extend the life of your brushes is to prewet your paints because dipping delicate brush hairs into anything less than the softest of pigments will fray ends, snap hairs, and cause the brush's belly to lose its shape. Also, when rinsing your brush at the end of your painting session, always reshape the brush into a point to preserve it, and lay it flat to dry.





The Bamboo Garden is located on the campus of Foothill College on a hillside below the <u>Japanese Cultural Center</u>. It contains over 70 varieties of bamboo and covers an area of two acres. Here, the bamboos, many of them not commonly seen in the United States, are being studied for their adaptability to the San Francisco Bay Area climate.

This 14-acre site contains 32 original and reproduction homes, businesses, and landmarks, including the Electric Light Tower and Southern Pacific Railroad Steam Locomotive. Unlike recent years, they are now open in the mornings during the summer months.

Directions: Interstate 280 to Los Altos Hills. From 280 take the Moody/El Monte turn off and go south on El Monte Road. Enter Foothill Campus at the first entrance. Follow the one-way Perimeter Road around the campus. The parking lots are numbered sequentially. Park in Lot 6 and purchase a \$3 day- use permit. The parking machines accept credit/ debit cards and cash, but do not give change (if they are active) (They were NOT working recently). Walk onto campus in the opposite direction from Perimeter Road and past Building 7400, and you will see the bamboo garden below, with the Japanese Cultural Center (Building 6600) on the hill above it.

Directions: From 101 take Story Road West, left on Senter Road, left on Phelan. From 280, exit at 10th/11th Streets, follow signs to Spartan Stadium, left on Phelan. In both cases, follow Phelan Avenue to the parking lot at the end of the street where parking costs \$6

General Information:

The usual start time for Paintsites is flexible. Unless a different start time is announced, the organizers will be there from around 10 am. Since a couple of the sites are remote where mobile service may be absent, the coordinators may be unreachable, or GPS inaccurate, please check instructions before heading out. Often people stay until early afternoon, taking a packed lunch to eat at the site.

Please note: Should inclement weather or unforeseen events cause cancellation of an event, it will be announced on the "Thursday Paintsites" section of scvws.org by 8 AM on the day of the event. Cancellation will also be announced by email, but the timing of SCVWS Paintsite emails cannot be guaranteed.

There is a famous natural bridge, rocks, shorebirds, and crashing waves. The park also includes a large area of coastal scrub and grasslands, and Moore Creek which flows through the park, forming freshwater wetlands and a salt marsh before it reaches the sea. We will eat our bag lunches at the picnic tables which overlook the ocean.

Directions: Take Highway 17 to Santa Cruz and exit north on Highway 1 towards Half Moon Bay. Drive 1.1 miles on Hwy 1, take a slight right turn onto CA-1/Mission St. to stay on Hwy 1 and drive 1.6 miles. Turn left on Swift Avenue and drive 0.7 miles. Turn right on West Cliff Drive, follow the winding road along the coast until it ends at Natural Bridges State Beach. There is a State Park fee of \$10/\$9 seniors for the parking lot.



Hike and Sketch San Bruno Mountain Park Saddle Loop Trail, Brisbane map

San Mateo Parks County Parks states that "San Bruno Mountain Park is a landmark of local and regional significance, standing as a unique open-space island in the midst of the peninsula's urbanization at the northern end of the Santa Cruz Mountain Range. The Mountain's ridge line runs in an east-west configuration, with considerable slopes and elevations ranging from 250 feet to 1,314 feet at the summit. The 2,416 acres of rugged landscape offer excellent hiking opportunities and outstanding views of San Francisco and Central Bay Area."

Meet at the picnic area near the entrance to the Saddle Loop Trail. Leaders will be there to greet from 10 -10:15, then hikers will walk about half a mile (15mins) to a spot with good views. Belongings should be light. Besides art materials, bring a hat, a lightweight chair, and a warm jacket. Washrooms next to the parking lots.

Directions to the Park: From Hwy 101, take exit 426A to Bayshore Blvd in Brisbane. Proceed on Bayshore Boulevard to Guadalupe Canyon Parkway. Turn west on Guadalupe Canyon Parkway toward the Mountain and proceed up the hill for about 5 min to the park entrance on your right.

From Highway 280 North, take the Mission Street exit. Head left (north) on Junipero Serra Blvd. Turn right onto San Pedro Blvd. San Pedro Blvd will turn E Market Street, and E Market Street will turn into Guadalupe Canyon Parkway, which will take you eastward up the canyon. The Park entrance will be on your left toward the top of the hill.

WYETH'S WATERCOLOR TOOLS

recent New England museum watercolor exhibits offered a rich education about paint and light. The Farnsworth Art Museum in Rockland, Maine, presented a small and mesmerizing comparison of selected works by Edward Hopper (1882-1967) and Andrew Wyeth (1917-2009). On their separate visits nearly 50 years apart, Hopper and Wyeth explored the historic industries of Rockland, especially lime quarrying and fishing. A wall card noted that Wyeth once recalled Hopper saying during their final conversation, "Andy, I've decided the only thing that interests me is how the sun hits a white wall."

A larger show, "American Watercolors, 1880–1990: Into the Light," at the Harvard Art Museums in Cambridge, Massachusetts, featured 100 rarely seen watercolors by both well-known and historically under-represented American artists. Hung alongside Winslow Homer and John Singer Sargent were compelling pieces by Bill Traylor, John Marin, and contemporaries such as Richard Foster Yarde.




MULTIPLE FIGURES



To maximize eye-pleasing variation, groups of figures should be arranged according to the One Rule of Composition: Never make any two intervals the same.


By changing the size of the figures, and the spacing between them, you can create varying intervals that work to create interest in your paintings.




Even spacing is boring Equally spaced figures of the same height are boring and look unnatural.



Ground level placement is unexcitingUnequally spaced figures of different heights and eye levels is more interesting, but the ground level is parallel to the bottom edge.



Varied spacing is better Unequally spaced figures are more appealing and suggest more interesting social dynamics.



Asymmetry suggests tension

The eye and mind group proximate figures together. The three figures on the left form a unit; the figure on the right is isolated. This arrangement is not only attractive to the eye, but interesting to the mind because it suggests some sort of social tension.



Scale variation creates depth

Varying the scale of figures creates spatial depth and increases interest. Note that all the figures share the same eye level, which coincides with the horizon line and eye level of the viewer.



Variety creates visual energy

When figures in a scene are at different heights, eye levels, and distances, the visual energy is maximized.

Anne Massie was an American Postwar and contemporary artist. She was awarded the designation of Dolphin Fellow of the American Watercolor Society.
