Born in 1980 in Saitama Prefecture, Japan, Ai completed her Ph.D. in Japanese Painting at the Graduate School of Tokyo University of the Arts, after graduating from the Department of Japanese Painting, Faculty of Fine Arts, at the same university. She teaches painting at "Atelier AI," as well as at NHK Culture, Asahi Culture, Seven Academy (Sekai Bunka Publishing), and holds one-day workshops in various places throughout Japan including Tokyo, Sapporo, Nagoya, Osaka, Kobe, Takamatsu, and Hiroshima.

She is also famous for her love of polar bears and pandas, and has been painting them in watercolors for about three years, with over 200 pieces created.

Her watercolor works, based on Japanese painting techniques and featuring beautiful, serene colors, have gained international attention as uniquely Japanese art. website



1st PLACE: \$700 PETER CAREY "Buongiorno Firenze"



This scene with the grand architecture is captivating, and then we're drawn to the people, exquisitely rendered as well, as they scurry along. The well organized, horizonal light pattern under the main crowd keeps us in the picture and we can imagine being there.

2nd PLACE: \$500 RAFAEL DESOTO, JR. "Latches and Shadows"



I love the idea of taking a common subject and letting us see the design in it. The texture of the wood and lock are well done and help us to know what is portrayed here, but this painting is more than these 'things'. It's really about how the light and shadows play on the wood.

3rd PLACE: \$300 ANNIE HAINES "Pinnacles Formations"



I love the brush strokes here that say how rugged this climb may be, how wonderfully clear and blue the sky may be up there, and how exciting it may be to hike up there exhibited through these joyful colors. This is a strong intuitive painting.

EMERGING ARTIST: \$100 SUSAN SERVER "Three Boats, Scilla, Italy"



I love the movement and relationship of the boats and the pier. The sweeping white line curves and extends way out to the boats as they float in this transparent blue water. The viewer stands above the water on the pier looking down on these three boats perfectly spaced in this sunny harbor.

HONORABLE MENTION: \$100 DMITRY GRUDSKY "Magic Flute"



This portrait is perfectly and beautifully rendered, using both soft and hard edges when needed. I can feel her concentration through her body language and her fingers as they choose the right notes.

HONORABLE MENTION: \$100 HELEN JONES "Caring Hands"



The movement of shapes, color and brush strokes wrap around and hold on to the cat, perfectly illustrating this emotion of caring. I love the placement on the paper, as we look down on this somber and loving job. His hand and arm are large, and the blanket is warm in color. The watercolor techniques show a feeling of tenderness and love.

HONORABLE MENTION: \$100 CANDY YU "The Gorge"



This painting is fun and has a lot of mystery. I'm not sure what is happening in some places, but I don't care because the overall mastery of the watercolor medium is what this painting is about. Maybe this artist let things just happen, letting the paint flow intuitively. I don't know, but it feels that way. For me, it says 'gorge,' a feeling of deep surprise.

THEME INTERPRETATION: \$50 SUSAN JOCHHEIM "Eye Spy"



This painting exhibits many of watercolor's magical abilities, mingling, edges, color changes, values and especially mystery. The twisting of tree branches often gives us a feeling of what may be hiding in there, spying. The design and colors in this painting leave us wondering.

MASTERFUL TECHNIQUE: \$50 DOUGLAS GREER "Miss Llagas Creek"



We are able to feel the texture of the deer's hair, see the highlights in her eye and nose, and notice the sun on her back. Edges - dark against light and light against dark, both help to describe her and put her in the environment. We know where the sun is coming from and how far away the trees are behind her.

BEST IN LIVING COLOR: \$50 IRIS LIAN "Birds of a Feather"



We love the mingling of all the wonderful colors in this painting. The dark background and white floor help to emphasize and exaggerate the color. The abstract design of the shapes is beautifully organized.



Painting California Coastlines

This 3-day workshop will focus on learning how to paint beautiful California coastlines in watercolor using photo references from Sonoma, Santa Cruz and Monterey.

Lessons will be based on painting in a representational, impressionistic manner with consideration in developing your personal style. Learn methods for painting waves, rocks, ocean currents, wet sand, cliffs and dunes. Emphasis will be on creating compelling compositions, using tonal values and effective application of color. Procedures for washes, blending, underpainting, layering, dry brush, masking, lifting and scraping will be explored. Tips on interpreting photo reference, using thumbnail sketches, and plein-air painting set ups are included. Students will also be coached on learning how to view subjects simply in order to paint boldly and confidently.

Lectures will be followed by demonstrations along with easy-to-follow step-by-step instruction. Constructive critiques will be offered. Students can expect to complete at least one painting each day.





Beautiful views, lots of irises (can be purchased), other flowers, and a wonderful hoard of bits and pieces, including farm machinery and gardening equipment at this private property in the foothills beyond Scotts Valley. There is a barn, sheds, and a little creek running across the property with a small bridge. It's just delightful! The property was once a stage stop between Santa Cruz and San Jose where the stages changed to a fresh team of horses to go over the hill. The old house dates back to the late 1840s and has stood during two major earthquakes, 1906 and 1989. Due to distance from the Bay Area, carpooling is encouraged.

Directions: Take the first Scotts Valley exit off Highway 17 South, Scotts Valley Dr, and turn right. Go straight across Scotts Valley Drive to Glenwood Drive. Follow this road just over a mile and take Canham Road on the right. Property is the first one on the left.

Restrooms: The Cummings private residence may not make restrooms available. Use nearby restrooms at <u>Sitanen Park</u> or <u>Skypark</u>.

AS THIS IS A PRIVATE RESIDENCE, PLEASE DO NOT ARRIVE BEFORE 10:00 am.

General Information:

The usual start time for Paintsites is flexible. Unless a different start time is announced, the organizers will be there from around 10 am. Since a couple of the sites are remote where mobile service may be absent, the coordinators may be unreachable, or GPS inaccurate, please check instructions before heading out. Often people stay until early afternoon, taking a packed lunch to eat at the site.

Please note: Should inclement weather or unforeseen events cause cancellation of an event, it will be announced on the "Thursday Paintsites" section of scvws.org by 8 AM on the day of the event. Cancellation will also be announced by email, but the timing of SCVWS Paintsite emails cannot be guaranteed.

We will paint at the public grounds of a cloistered monastery in Santa Clara. There is a beautiful chapel, bell tower, cloister walk, large olive grove, and small garden. It is an oasis of tranquility. A 1970 marker on the monastery grounds states about the chapel, "It is considered the most perfect example of Spanish Renaissance Ecclesiastical architecture in the New World."

Because the roads inside the monastery grounds are quite narrow, we have been asked not to set up our easels on the roads.

Directions: From San Tomas Expressway, take Benton Street east and drive 0.9 miles, turn right onto Lincoln Street. Partway up the block you will find the gate leading to the monastery. **Because parking inside the monastery grounds is quite limited, we have been asked to park along Lincoln Street.** Walk through the gate and along the tree-lined road. It is about 500 feet from the gate to the front of the chapel.

We have received special permission to paint at Hidden Villa, the site of the historic Mediterranean-style Duveneck home, once a stagecoach stop, and now a preserve with an organic farm, farm animals, farm implements, and old barns. The farm's main focus is to promote environmental education and regularly provides tours for school age children. When you set up to paint, please do not block any trail/path or gate entry access and keep voices low so as not interrupt tour groups.

Restroom - Porta Potties on site **Parking** - \$10 entry fee per car to be paid at the gatehouse. Carpooling suggested.

Directions: Interstate 280 to Los Altos Hills. From 280 take the Moody/El Monte exit and go south on El Monte past the Foothill college entrance. At the next stop sign turn left and follow Moody Road for 1.7 miles to the entrance on the left. There is a \$10 vehicle parking fee near the entrance. After paying, continue and meet at the main parking lot.

This 14.5 acre Historic Park is located on the Oracle Santa Clara campus on property which was the site of the Agnews State Hospital. Four historic buildings within the park are preserved as part of the historic easement. The Auditorium, Mansion, and Clock Tower are set among old elm trees on a shaded grass area. Meet at the Clock Tower.

Directions: From Bayshore 101 take Montague Expressway East and go 0.9 miles, take the Lafayette St. exit, turn right onto Lafayette and go 0.2 miles, turn right on Palm Dr. where there is street parking.

We have special permission to paint at the Kirk-Farrington House in San Jose. The house is a beautiful white Italianatestyle Victorian built in 1878 by Theophilus Kirk. The garden has some lovely plantings including roses, wisteria, and peonies in bloom. We will be too late for the latter blooms but the roses will be in their prime. We have been asked specifically not to dispose of waste water. We suggest that you bring a separate empty container to remove your used painting water.

Directions: Check a map for best directions from your area. Coming from the north on Hwy 280, exit Meridian Ave South and turn left on Dry Creek Road. Coming from the south, take Hwy 85, and exit Branham Lane, left on Meridian, right on Dry Creek, or exit Hwy 17 at Hamilton Ave East, right on Meridian, left on Dry Creek. Please park on the street because the house and grounds, including the gates for the on-site parking lot, are locked at 1:00 PM.


TEMPERATURE DOMINANCE

EXCERPTED FROM "THE SIMPLE SECRET TO BETTER PAINTING" BY GREG ALBERT

When thinking about the colors of your composition, you don't even have to think about specific hues, only color temperature. To make your painting pleasing, you simply need to vary the quantities of warm and cool colors, so they are not equal. There should be either more cool colors than warm, or more warm colors than cool.


You also need a touch or two of contrasting color (and value) to strengthen the center of interest. This color contrast becomes a natural focal point and should be located at your picture's center of interest. In other words, the colors should be mostly of one temperature, some of the other, and a bit of contrast.

If the dominant colors are warm, the composition will have an overall warm tone, and can be described as being warm dominant, If the dominant colors are cool, the composition is cool dominant.



Warm dominant
